Other Survey Work



Bird Surveys

With a deep passion for the birdlife of the New Forest, we are frequently involved in bird survey work, collaborating closely with organizations such as Forestry England, Hampshire Ornithological Society (HOS), the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO), the RSPB, the Countryside Service, and local Wildlife Trusts.

Regular surveys include:

- Monthly WeBS (Wetland Bird Survey): Conducted for the BTO at Normandy Marsh.
- Annual BBS (Breeding Bird Survey): Focused on a square within Pignal Inclosure.

We also contribute to species-specific surveys, such as recent studies on Woodlark and Marsh Tit. Additionally, we dedicate significant time to monitoring ground-nesting waders and woodland specialist species. Our work often includes observing communal roost sites for Little Egret, Marsh Harrier, and wintering wildfowl, helping to improve understanding of these important populations.

Bee Surveys

Starting in 2025, we will take on a Bee transect survey in partnership with the Bumblebee Conservation Trust. We are passionate about bees in the New Forest and aim to raise awareness of their ecological importance while improving knowledge of the diverse species present in the area.

Moth Surveys

As a self-proclaimed moth enthusiast for nearly 20 years, we are always eager for opportunities to survey these fascinating creatures. Moths are vital indicators of biodiversity, and with over 2,000 species recorded in the UK, there is always something new to discover. Our work highlights the ecological value of moths and contributes to broader efforts to understand and protect them.
